

Code 1209. Central America-North America Migration Dialogue (Canamid): an Overview of Findings

Length /Duración: 120 minutes

The aim of Canamid is to generate updated evidence to support the design of public policies that take care of the main problems of the migrant populations from the Northern Triangle countries of Central America (Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras). It focuses on the conditions at the origin, on the transit, settlement in Mexico and the United States, and possible return. Canamid gathered experts from the academic, NGO and public sector from five countries to synthesize the most updated evidence in a series of policy briefs grouped in five priority areas: population, health, education, labor, and governability. This workshop will provide an overview of the trends and patterns of this complex phenomenon over the last three decades, the changes and continuities of transit migration through Mexico, access to health services by transit migrants, the labor market incorporation of Central American immigrants in Mexico, as well as access to school and educational gaps of their children.
