

Code 1360. Migration Patterns, Policies and Management across Major World Regions Length/Duración: 180 minutes

In the last 30 years regionalization and globalization forces have shaped the mobility and migration of individuals across countries and regions. Major efforts of multilateral cooperation have forged a diverse and different approach and results on migration and their impacts. Some of the efforts have been paved the way to improve the conditions of immigrants while others have generated more restrictive and daring conditions. Panelists examine the different conditions in which immigration is managed, perceived, negotiated and regulated by countries across major regions of the world, such as Europe, North America, South America and Asia. Recent case studies will demonstrate the challenges and opportunities to formulate and implement sensible unilateral, bilateral and multilateral policies.
